

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


In Memoriam

On Sunday, October 1, Paul Jablonski, Associate Director/Captain for Public Safety, peacefully passed away after a short illness. Paul had not been feeling well for several weeks. On September 6, he went to a concert with some friends. Afterwards, he was having difficulty breathing and drove himself to the emergency room at St. Mary's on the Lake Hospital. His health deteriorated quickly and it was later diagnosed that Paul had suffered Acute Respiratory Distress and a massive inflammatory system response. He was 44 years old.

Paul is survived by his mother, Marion; five sisters, Mary, Christine, Monica, Jan, and Judith; four brothers, Lou, James, Gregory, and David; and many other family members and friends.

Paul had been a part of the Marquette campus for 18 years. He earned his B.A. and M.A. degrees in history and was a respected member of Public Safety. He worked closely with Facilities Services, IT Services, Facilities Planning, Design and Construction, and many other departments, colleges, offices, the Milwaukee Police Department, and City agencies on various projects including the Avenues West Substation on 21st and Wells Streets, Public Safety's CIC (Command Information Center), as well as the University's Critical Incident Management Plan.



Paul had many interests outside of Marquette, including his 18 years of volunteer work at the Tipperary and Aer Lingus music stage at Irish Fest where he acted as a soundman, an equipment crewman, a backstage co-manager, and a security man.

Paul would make many trips to Glacier National Park with family, friends, and sometimes alone. Paul had hoped to one day retire there.

Paul's absence from Marquette, and the Milwaukee community, will be felt for some time.

The award is presented to individuals based on nominations by students and staff as well as the following criteria:

- how the candidate dedicates herself/himself to the ideals of the college union/student activities field;
- the candidate's volunteer and leadership experience and unselfish giving to the region and the college union/student activities field in working with staff, students, and community organizations;
- the character strengths that distinguishes the candidate from other staff, students, or new professionals; and,
- reasons why the candidate deserves to receive the award.

This award is a yearly recognition given by the Association of College Unions International (ACUI). The ACUI brings together college union and student activities professionals from hundreds of schools worldwide. This award is one of only two staff recognition awards given at the annual regional conference. ACUI Region 8 (Wisconsin, Chicago's metropolitan area, and Michigan's Upper Peninsula), of which Marquette is part, is an association representing students and professionals in college union programs from two-year and four-year, public and private, rural and urban institutions of higher education.
